



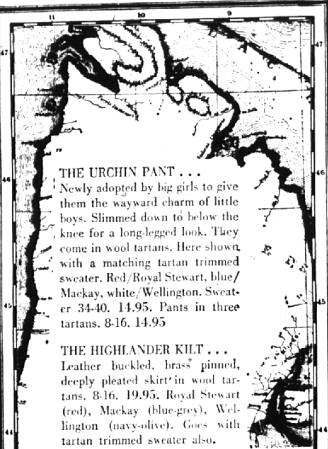
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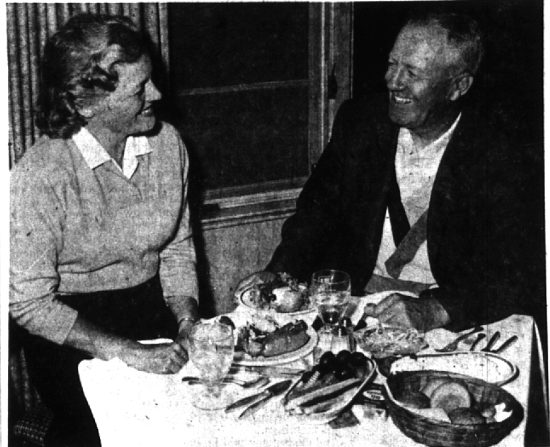
THE URCHIN PANT . . .

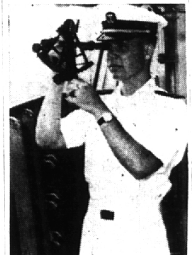

\$25 Million Bonds Approved For State Roads

LANSING—The state administrative board has approved sale of another \$25 million bond issue to finance highway construction.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said bids for the bonds would be taken on Sept. 20.

Funds from sale of the bonds would be used to finance construction and modernization of 618 miles of multi-lane highways and 243 miles of two-lane roads.

HE IS ONE OF 15 midshipmen who boarded the Des Moines June 25, and received practical "at sea" experience in seamanship, navigation, engineering and gunnery to help prepare them for Naval commissions upon graduation.

Prior to their return to the states, they visited the French Riviera.

TOTAL COST of the projects is estimated at more than \$500 million. The balance of the cost will be paid for by federal aid, funds the highway department receives from gasoline taxes and license fees and future bond issues.

It will be the third of a series of bond issues expected to total \$250 million by 1963, Mackie announced when he became highway commissioner in 1957, that Michigan would use its highway bonding powers to complete the state's five-year, \$1.4 billion roadbuilding program.
