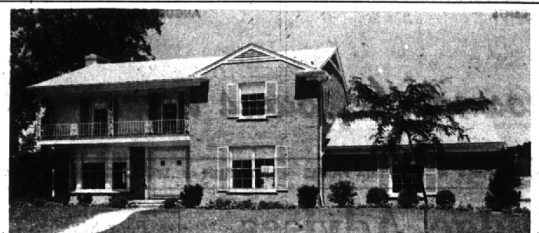
Beverly Gets Ready For Sale of Bonds

BEVERLY HILLS—Issuance of \$510,000 in special assessment bonds to pay for lateral sewers in 20 special assessment districts was authorized last week by the council. Also approved was \$140,000 in general obligation bonds for three trunk sewers and two pumping stations.

Voters approved the general obligation issue in a March 14 election and assessment rolls in the districts have been approved. Sale of \$650,000 in bonds for sanitary and trunk line sewers west of Evergreen road in the village is required for the sanitary sewer project.

To Open Bids

SOUTHFIELD—A special meeting of the board of education will be held Monday night to open bids for a \$525,000 loan against 1960 anticipated taxes. The loan, authorized at the Aug. 8 board meeting, received approval from the Michigan Municipal Finance commission Aug. 16.
