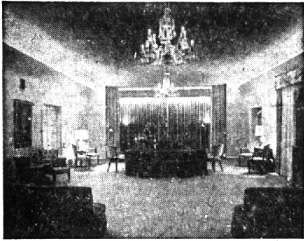

nations that cooperate in such great agencies as the World Council of Churches. I cannot believe that in the congregations which represent these major denominations you would find what you have claimed to find.

YOU MENTIONED that you are a Baptist. I would draw your attention to a wonderful program aimed at mutual understanding that has been sponsored by the First Baptist church of Birmingham of late. In this program a Roman Catholic priest, a Jewish rabbi and several clergymen of other Protestant denominations were brought in to address the group and outline their faith.

This type of program has been carried out in many of our local congregations, and it represents a serious attempt to do just the opposite of what you claim to have found among us. A Jewish professor and theologian addressed the

Birmingham Council of Churches meeting this past month on the topic of Jewish theology. A Roman Catholic theologian has been invited to address the council this coming month on the theology of the Incarnation.

I MIGHT ADD that the Jewish professor found the group congenial enough to request being invited to come back next month as a participant in the discussion! As to your question regarding who can be your friends, I can only remind you that as a Christian all men are to be the object of your love, friendship, concern and respect. This is the directive of our Lord. This is also the message of His Church. I earnestly hope that you and all concerned Christians will strive to hasten the day when this our goal will be perfectly realized!
