How well do junior high schools in this suburban area measure up to the best educational standards practiced in other parts of the country? An evaluation of Birmingham, Bloom-field Hills and Southfield junior high schools is possible on the basis of a re-cently published report by noted educa-tor Dr. James B. Conant, former pres-

tor Dr. James B. Conant, for ident of Harvard university. The report is the re-sult of a year's study of 237 schools and 90 school systems in 23 states, un-der a grant by the Car-negie foundation. It is a sequel to the Conant re-port on high schools, which received wide-spread recognition when published almost two years ago.
