He was educated in the Detroit public schools and the Detroit Business Institute. Mr. Monnier was a member of Ashler Lodge 91 F&AM.

His father, Francis Monnier, was a pioneer Michigan naturalist, sculptor and taxidermist, some of whose stuffed passenger pigeons are owned by the Cranbrook Institute of Science.

Emergency Repairs Okayed for Bridge

City commissioners have authorized the city manager to proceed with repairs on the Baldwin street bridge in Birmingham.

The commission action came when City Manager L. R. Gare explained that a report from Peter Mortenson Jr., consulting engineer for bridge construction, showed that one of the I-beams on the bridge had deteriorated badly.

ALTHOUGH THE bridge had not been included in planned bridge construction for the spring season, Gare said, certain emergency repairs would be necessary at this time. Warning and load restriction signs have been posted.

Gare estimated cost of emergency repairs at \$2,000.

Wood Railroad Ties Prove the Best

Another tribute to the resiliency and long life of wood is made by S. R. Hursh, chief engineer of the Pennsylvania railroad.

Hursh notes that all railroad ties made from material other than wood either corrode, crack, warp or rot too much, weigh too much or cost too much. Now with chemical treatment for the wood ties, they last twice as long and no other type of crosstie has been used on the Pennsylvania since 1942.

Wood ties, treated and untreated, have been used exclusively on this system since 1928.
