Police Chiefs Formulate Disaster Plan

What if a south Oakland city were caught in the shock of a major disaster—would police, civil defense and firemen be ready? The answer, until recently, was no.

But a few weeks ago, at a meeting of the South Oakland Police Chiefs association, a co-ordinated plan for police operation was formulated. To prepare the plan, fourteen SOG communities banded together.

THEY ARE Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Beverly Hills, Southfield, Ferndale, Hazel Park, Oak Park, Madison Heights, Royal Oak, Clawson, Troy, Huntington Woods, Pleasant Ridge and Berkley.

As part of the plan, every officer with the rank of sergeant or above, including detectives, was a given eight hours of special classroom and practical training. Officers below the rank of sergeant will be trained by local departments.

"The program is designed to handle a disaster about the size of the Flint tornado a few years ago, or the Windsor store explosion," said the assistant Royal Oak police chief, Herman H. Patti. "If you don't know about an A-bomb attack, it would depend on how far from it the bomb hit."

THIS IS AN idea for those who are in charge of Scout troops or Sunday school classes and are looking for a project. You secure 250 brown grocery bags and have the children crayon a picture on the paper. Then begin to make a collar on the bag folding twice with the border being about 2 inches wide.

Fill the inside of the bag with one quart of sand and insert in the sand a candle about 6 inches high. It is supposed to make a stunning mysterious light at night when lit. The sand will prevent it from blowing away.

with a few artificial flowers poked into it and a colorful ball at the neck.

Tall stemmed wine glasses had beef wood with gold ribbon with red candles and greens placed in them for the winter.

At the base of the glasses was artificial fruit.
