Decorative Yule Logs Displayed

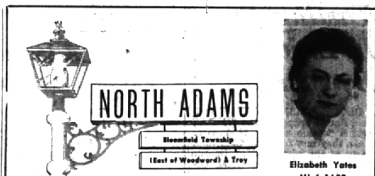
