

## Beverly Hills Reviews Water, Sewer Progress

BEVERLY HILLS — Beverly Hills Monday night took action on two matters. Councilmen approved minutes and paid bills.

The discussion department of the session, however, dealt with more urgent but pending topics.

Councilmen reviewed the proposed water system for the southwest territory of the village. They took note of the bids due Dec. 15 for the connection of 667 lots in the village's western half to the Oakland county's new Evergreen interceptor.

IN DISCUSSING the water system, village engineering consultants Johnson and Anderson presented preliminary plans and data on the program that would eventually solve the serious water shortage in South Berkshires area.

Village President Marvin Cline questioned engineers on the size of piping, existing mains and the location of laterals.

Engineers, still in the early stages of planning, stated that they are designing the system for ultimate growth.

"We must build for peak flow and fire demand not just for home consumption," they explained.

## Property Owners Elect Officers For Association

WING LAKE — The Wing Lake property owners association has elected Roderic V. Wiley, 6425 Wing Lake road, president of the reorganized board of trustees.

Other officers elected are treasurer, Thomas C. Garter, 6105 Worthington and secretary, John D. Dunn, 6833 Worthington.

The council also touched on the sewer laterals for the village's western half. Bids are due next week for the program although state approval for the bond issue has not yet been finalized.

A representative of Johnson and Anderson reported he will convene with state officials to hurry the okay.

The bond issue was submitted for approval from the state health department, finance commission and auditor general's office in mid-August. The procedure usually takes from 12 to 16 weeks, according to Village Manager Robert Murphy.

Contractors bidding will be expected to hold their bids valid for 90 days.

One or more floor-to-ceiling areas of glass are found in 86 per cent of housing now being built for owner occupancy, a nationwide survey reports.
