City Officials Argue Over Troy Airstrip

An airstrip owned by the Jim Robbins company ignited another argument between Mayor Robert J. Huber of Troy and City Commissioner Louis Yanich at a special commission meeting Thursday night.

Huber insisted that Yanich's charges that the landing field behind Robbins' plastics firm at 14 Mile and Stephenson highway was a menace to public safety because of its nearness to the Troy drive-in theater, were ridiculous.

Yanich, on the other hand, claimed that there is the danger of an airplane crashing into the drive-in while taking off from the field.

ACCORDING TO Yanich, the Robbins firm "just went ahead and built a mile-long strip before applying for a building permit," and he thought the city should bring legal action against Robbins for doing this.

Louie (Yanich), said Huber, "obviously just wants to drive industry out of the city."

City Attorney Stanley Burke informed the commissioners that the city does not have an airport ordinance and, therefore, anyone could build an airfield on his own property under the present laws.

Troy Complains Edison Substation Is in X-Way Route

The Troy city commission and state highway department and Detroit Edison officials are disagreeing over the location of the Edison substation at Adams and 19 Mile (Square Lake) which the commission contends is in the path of the new Chrysler expressway.

But state and company officials denied the claim, offering proof of their stand. John Knecht, of the state highway route location bureau pointed out that an exact location was not possible since the engineers need some leeway in designing the route.

"The route will run right between the Edison company land and the southern tip of the Charwood subdivision on the north," he said.

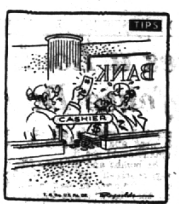

'Ham' Operators Must Meet Deadline Today

Secretary of State James M. Hare today reminded "ham radio operators" that, Thursday, Dec. 15, and not Feb. 28, is the stationary deadline for ordering the call letters automobile plates issued to holders of amateur radio licenses.

Hare said that nearly 2,000 Michigan "ham" operators now drive cars bearing their call letters. "It will not be necessary for those who already have call letters to apply again," Hare said. "They, like all other car owners, can buy their 1961 tabs at any of our branch offices. Those who are applying for the first time should contact our Special License section first. The fee is \$2. They will receive a 1959 yellow and green plate with their call letters and a 1961 tab. Next year all must re-apply for new 1962 plates."
