## Remus Announces One Year Delay In Water Line

Because customers have been signing up slower than was anticipated, Detroit's first water line from Lake Huron has been delayed one year until 1967. The delay represents a change in schedule, not in planning, according to Gerald R. Remus, head of the Detroit Water System. Remus said that Detroit has its route from Lake Huron charted and that engineering studies on a plant in the lake are continuing. He was invited to Pontiac to report to Oakland County officials on the progress of the metropolitan water plan which was announced by Detroit in 1959.

It is the wait in Oakland and Macomb counties that led to the delay, he said. He said that Pontiac, Troy and Utica "have not come along" as fast as was expected, citing these cities as examples. THE LINES ARE financed through revenue bonds whose only security is committed paying customers. Pontiac officials reportedly are waiting to learn whether the major auto plants in the city will take Detroit water or continue use of private wells. Remus noted that some potential customers must build or rebuild internal distribution systems in order to take water from Detroit. Troy is one of these cities. The Lake Huron Water System will provide a second supply in the event the Detroit River is infected and to insure enough water for the

metropolitan area. Additional production of water is not necessary now, Remus said.

## Defer Action On Authority's, Policy Wording

Action on the adoption of a "statement of policy" for the South Oakland Garbage and Rubbish Authority was deferred last week. Two members, City Administrator Jerald D. Stone of Lathrup and Fred L. Yockey of Huntington Woods, felt any such action now would only anger already upset councilmen from Madison Heights. Madison Heights does not want the proposed expanded incinerator in their city but they do want steps taken to solve existing problems of fly ash, truck traffic and odor. The Authority denies the existence of such problems. Yockey suggested the following statement: "We have negotiated in good faith with Madison Heights in the past and will continue to do so."

HE ADDED THAT Madison Heights needs the other cities in the authority as much as they need Madison Heights. Edward M. Shafter of Royal Oak said the board would be acquiring to the charges if nothing were said. Stone said the statement was not one of policy but full of opinion.

## George Fulkerson Receives Position As Highway Aide

George F. Fulkerson, Birmingham Democrat, has been named special assistant for highway condemnation in Oakland county by State Atty. Gen. Paul L. Adams. Fulkerson will remain a candidate for appointment as U.S. district attorney in Detroit, a position which Democrats will fill in January.

A CANDIDATE for prosecutor Nov. 8, Fulkerson has been endorsed for the Federal post by county organization. County chairman James M. Ginn said he considered highway appointment "as merely an adjunct to a man's private practice" and therefore it does not remove Fulkerson from consideration for the district attorney job.

## MSU, B'ham Schools Offer Three Courses

The science of human relations, the psychology of personality and the mysteries of the stars will be explored in Birmingham this winter through three informal courses offered by Michigan State University.

The courses, each consisting of 10 two-hour sessions, are presented under the auspices of the MSU liberal arts adult education program in cooperation with the Birmingham Public Schools.

"HUMAN RELATIONS I" will meet Tuesdays from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. at W. E. Groves High School, beginning Feb. 14. It will be taught by Dr. James L. Grissell, assistant professor of psychology at Wayne State University. The course will examine the influence of culture upon human behavior. Dr. Grissell states, with reference to such factors as symbolic interaction, motivation, perception, group pressures and individual attitudes.

"NORMAL PERSONALITY II" will be offered 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Thursdays beginning Feb. 16, also at Groves. Teaching the course will be Dr. Bertram D. Cohen, WSU associate professor of psychology. Dr. Cohen notes that the material will cover techniques of personality assessment, biosocial bases for personality development, theoretical positions underlying therapy and various mental hygiene problems.

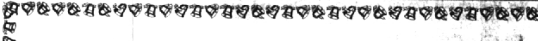

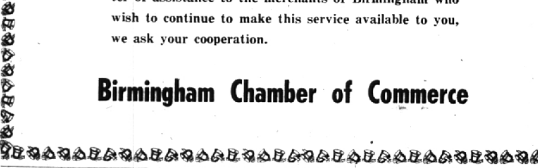
