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**Auto Engineers Plan Congress And Exposition**

Henry E. Chesebrough, 471 Dunston Road, Bloomfield Hills, president of the Society of Automotive Engineers and vice president of Chrysler Corp. has announced the forthcoming First International Congress and Exposition of Automotive Engineering.
