running towards him. When the bear was 10 yards away, he raised his rifle and shot the bear in the heart with one blast from his Weatherby 50.06.

Stanton, who is a pre-medical freshman at Flint Junior College, was hunting near Osceola, about six miles from Kingsley in north-eastern Michigan. His brother Mike and his cousin Jerome Whittenburg accompanied him.

He has been hunting only four years and now has two bucks and a bear to his credit. David Stanton Sr., his father, has been hunting in the same area for the past 30 years and has yet to shoot a bear.

The bear's coat will be made into a rug, which will be between Stanton Jr.'s other two trophies—two deer heads. It cost about \$20 to have the coat treated and made into a rug.

Talking about the kill Stanton Jr. said, "I asked my cousin and brother to scout on a ridge. Then I walked down the ridge and sat under a tree to wait for the bear. I heard a lot of noise. I thought a hunter was approaching because a deer doesn't make too much noise. I turned and saw a big, pitch-black bear running toward me."

"When the bear got within 10 yards of me, he stopped and stared. My father's rifle ran through my mind. He said if I ever had a chance to shoot a bear, I should make sure my shot was in the bear in a vulnerable spot. I was a little apprehensive about my ability to do it. But I looked through my scope and quickly fired."

"It seems funny to use a scope like I was using a 10 yard away," said Stanton, "but I did. I didn't have time to flip the scope aside and use the sight."

"The bear leaped into the air. Then he turned and ran about 10 yards, falling into a ditch. I walked slowly up to him, and fire two more shots into his neck to make sure he was dead."

Stanton Jr. said the bear's coat was "beautiful," since it is pitch black and there are spots of white or brown on it.

The family is using all of the kill, inasmuch as they consider bear steaks more tasty than venison.

ORDINANCE NO 43 VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 11 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION, CONTROL, RESTRICTION AND LICENSING OF DOGS IN THE VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Section 3.01 (a) and Section 9.01 (d) of Ordinance No. 11 entitled "An Ordinance to Provide for the Regulation, Control, Restriction and Licensing of Dogs in the Village of Westwood, Oakland County, Michigan, and Providing Penalties for the Violation Thereof" be and the same are hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3.01 (a). Upon application filed with the Department of Public Safety giving the full name and residence of the applicant and upon payment of the license fee as hereinafter provided, the Department of Public Safety shall issue to each applicant a license to own or harbor a dog for the term commencing at the date of such license and terminating the first day of May following. Said applicant shall also present to the Department of Public Safety a certificate in form acceptable to that department, stating that said dog has been properly immunized against rabies subsequent to December 15th preceding the calendar year for which the license is to be issued if tissue vaccine was used, or within three years preceding the date of application if modified live rabies virus of chick embryo origin was used. For each license the Department of Public Safety shall at the time of issuing the license and for each renewal thereof collect of each applicant a license fee of Three Dollars (\$3.00) for each dog, provided such application is made on or March 1st. If said application is made after March 1st, the same shall be accompanied by the regular license fee, and in addition, a penalty of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog except as herein provided."

"Section 9.01 (d). The following violations may be settled at the Violations Bureau in lieu of having the violation prosecuted in Court, upon payment in accordance with the terms of this Ordinance of the respective penalty set opposite such named violations for the respective offense involved, as follows:

- Failure to have dog licensed \$5.00
- Failure to have license tag annexed to collar or harness of dog \$5.00
- Permitting dog to stray from premises of owner without being under reasonable control of some person or leash \$5.00
- Harboring a loud, frequent or habitual barking dog \$5.00

Section 2.01. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Resident Aids In Air Force Space Project

First Lieutenant Paul A. Phillips, of Mrs. Marion Phillips, 1206 Birch Street, is a pilot officer in the third successful series of recovery of a capsule from the firm of Boeing.

He was a member of the large force team working on Disaster 18. A rescue of human tissue in a test to determine the effects of the outer atmosphere on humans.

His professional skills were pooled with those of approximately 94 other officers and airman of the 552nd Airborne Early Warning and Control Wing's (Air Defense Command) Blueberry at Hickam AFB, Hawaii, from McClellan AFB, near Sacramento, Calif.

RC-121D SUPER Constellation " aerospace sentinels" of the 552nd serve as aerial command posts for the airborne recovery attempt. It is from these command posts in the sky that the recovery of the actual recovery by the C-119 comes.

More than 5 1/2 tons of electronic gear packed away in these giant air defense aircraft are used to spot the plummeting Discoverer capsule and to control the many aircraft and ships in the impact area of a successful recovery.

The ordinary day-in-day-out mission of the men of the 552nd is to fly their RC-121D "flying radar stations" along the Pacific Coast on a constant alert for approaching aircraft. These aerospace sentinels hover hundreds of miles out to sea to prevent any form of surprise attack.

THEY PROVIDE those extra few minutes of airborne early warning that could mean the difference between peace and conflict, and destruction for the cities of the United States and Canada.

"AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 9 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING CONDUCT CONSTITUTING AN OFFENSE IN THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS; PREVENTING VICE, DISORDER AND IMMORALITY; PROMOTING PUBLIC PEACE, SAFETY AND HEALTH; PROTECTING PUBLIC MORALS; PROTECTING PUBLIC AND PRIVATE PROPERTY; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF ITS PROVISIONS."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Section 3 (2) of Ordinance No. 9 entitled "An Ordinance Regulating Conduct Constituting an Offense by Persons in the Village of Beverly Hills; Preventing Vice, Disorder and Immorality; Promoting Public Peace, Safety and Health; Protecting Public Morals; Protecting Public and Private Property; and Prescribing Penalties for Violations of its Provisions" be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3 (2). Assault and Battery. No person in the Village shall attempt to commit an assault and battery or commit an assault and battery upon the person of another."

Section 2.01. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall become effective immediately upon publication.
