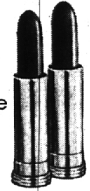
was in beige lace with satin trim) were spectators of the bowling for a short time, and the Alton Holes were quite engrossed in strikes and spares.

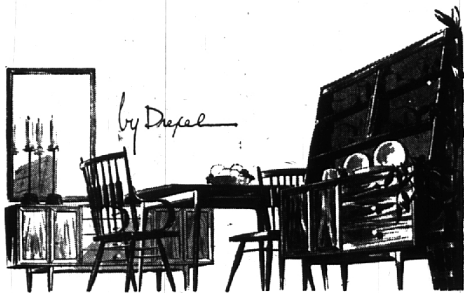
