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**Lathrup Drain Official Asks Change in Glenwood Route**

LATHRUP.—Chairman of the Lathrup storm water committee Tom Reed told council members that he will ask Stuart Bogte of Pate and Hirn the city's storm water engineers, next Monday evening to consider running the large Glenwood storm line down the center instead of the south side of Glenwood.

Reed said he had looked at the right of way on Glenwood and a cut down the center of the pavement would probably be easier to repair than damage to the edge of the pavement. The large east-west drain scheduled for Glenwood starts as a 24-inch drain on the east side of Southfield, jumps to a 27 inch, crosses Southfield road as a 30 inch and becomes a 42 inch drain before it reaches the Evans ditch.

IN HIS DISCUSSION, Reed told council members that the size of the digger for the drains would probably be about 12 tons, not 40 tons as stated by John Campbell at a meeting last week.

In comparison, Reed said the digger would probably be easier to shovel used to excavate a basement.

Working in and out of the discussion was the problem of the Evans ditch cleanup. If the storm water is moved by John Campbell by Lathrup voters on Feb. 16, the city will then face the problem of disposing of storm water in the choked-up little ditch.

Mayor Richard N. Cogger said he hoped that the bond issue would furnish enough extra funds to finance the Evans ditch cleanup.

HOWEVER, Cogger explained the Lathrup plans for the ditch.

**Three Break-Ins Reported in S'field**

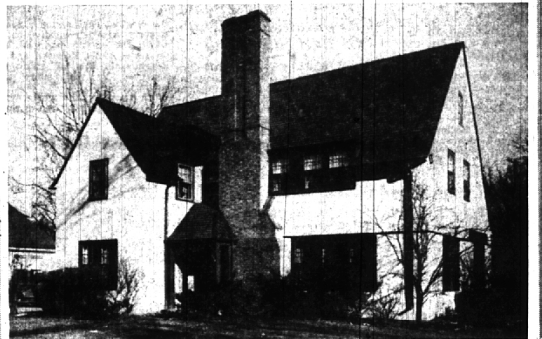

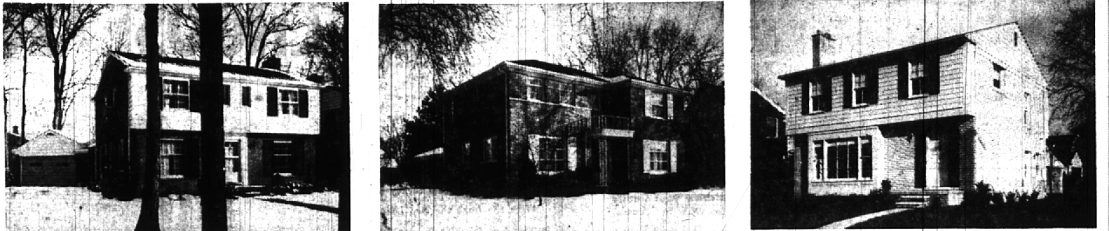

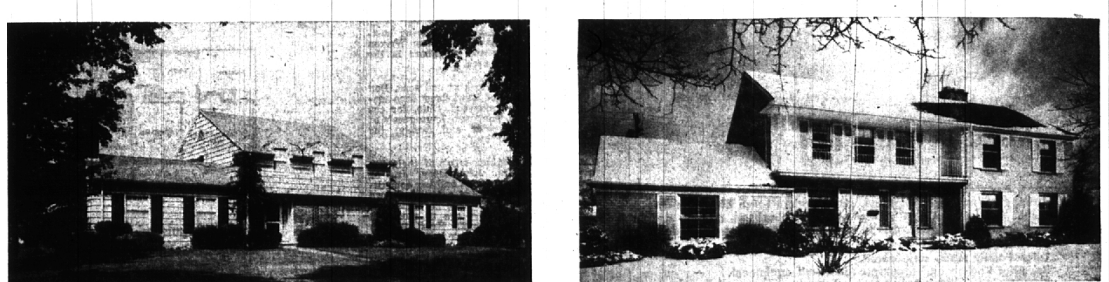
