Drain Problems Get Some Action In Beverly Hills

BEVERLY HILLS—Apparently giving the Beverly Artesian subdivision's flooded basement problem the number one priority which village engineers recommend, Beverly Hills moved to get an immediate survey of the subdivision's sewer system and a recommendation on a solution. At the same time the council authorized negotiations with Southfield on the Beverly Artesian storm sewer construction.

Village consulting engineers Johnson and Anderson will get \$520 for the survey, to be paid out of general funds.

The entire square mile in which the subdivision is located (from 13 to 15 Mile, from Southfield to Greenfield) is in trouble," the engineers stated.

THEY recommended the survey of the serious Beverly Artesian area bounded by Lauderdale, Pierce, 13 Mile and Acacia park cemetery first. The council agreed, asking for an estimate on when the rest of the square mile could be surveyed.

In a report to the council on the original engineering plans for Beverly Artesian subdivision, for which the village engineers drew up sewer plans, Johnson and Anderson said the 52 plans were approved by the county drain commission.

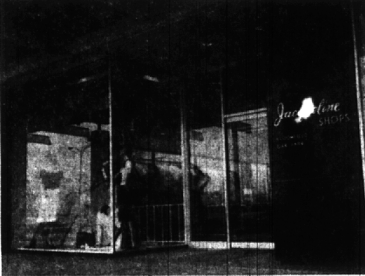
"In actuality, the whole system was not completed," the engineers said.

A PROPOSED 30-inch drain to route the subdivision's storm waters to the Evans ditch was never constructed, the engineers reported.

Indications are that Southfield is ready to discuss plans for Beverly Hills and the city to jointly construct the Beverly Artesian drain. Dr. Douglas Wood said Monday. The \$185,000 project would deepen the Evans ditch going westward across 13 Mile into Southfield. It would also add extra lines feeding into the ditch.

On the program for the evening will be the psycho-drama group of the social service department from Pontiac state hospital.

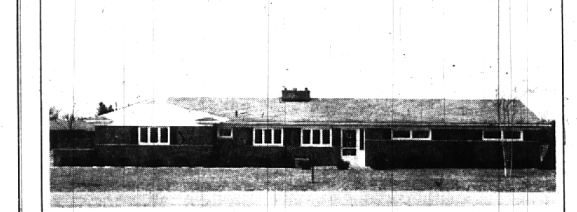

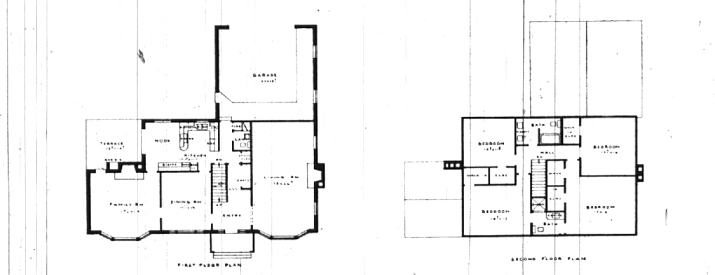
