### Misunderstanding On Sewer Project Seen in Beverly

BEVERLY HILLS—There appears to be a lot of misunderstanding over the Beverly Hills Village Councilman Leo Linsenmeyer said Monday night of the big sewer construction project proposed for the Valley Woods and South Berkshire subdivisions.

The council set a meeting with subdivision representatives for 8 p.m. Monday at the village offices. Councilman Dr. Douglas A. Wood and other village officials and engineers will attend.

A recent letter from Valley Woods association President Jack Bush asked clarification on whether sanitary sewers alone could be constructed legally, when special assessment district petitions submitted by residents asked for the sewers, plus drains, water and road improvement.

A PRIZE estimated at \$1,500 per lot for the total improvements would be impossible for many residents to manage, Bush said.

Engineers Johnson and Anderson have estimated the big sewer project alone at \$2½ million. About 420 of the 420 property owners \$810. It would enable the home owners in the western portion of the village to get rid of septic tanks. The internal sewers would be connected to the new green interceptor sewer now under construction.

## Ask Plat Approval For 26 More Lots In Nottingham

A second parcel of 25 lots has been submitted for plat approval by the Nottingham Forest developers, the real estate firm of Andrews and Briggs.

The new lots would be just south of the 40 lots already developed at the site near 14 Mile and Lahser. The request has been referred to the village planning commission.

Jack Andrews, a partner in the development firm, said this week that 23 of the original 40 lots have been sold, most of them to builders. In submitting the plans to the Beverly Hills council Monday night, Engineer Ralph Main said the firm wanted to begin work on Nottingham Forest No. 22 this spring.

He said restrictions to be applied would be as high or higher than village requirements, emphasizing "we want to cooperate."
