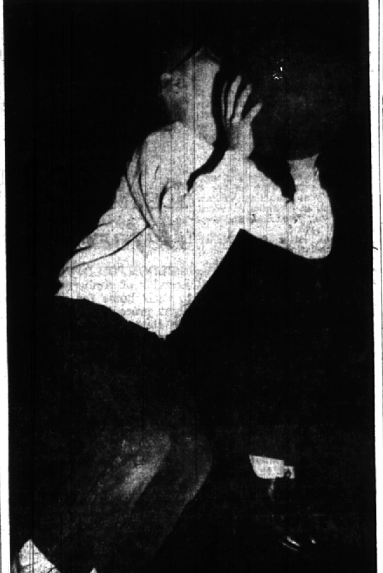
WHEN PERCY finished, I heard someone say, "Nevermind Nixon. Let's run Percy!"

Southfield to Seek Alternate Route For Expressway

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield council voted 4-2 last week to investigate an alternate route for the final one-eighth mile of the proposed east-west expressway in the northwest section of Southfield.

The council gave City Administrator Robert J. McNair permission to study the section in question. It is west of the Northwest-Telegraph intersection and runs to Inlander road, western boundary of the city, at 11 1/2 Mile road.

Irvine J. Rainin of the highway department warned that if council approval of a route was not soon forthcoming, costs for the expressway would skyrocket.
