Debate Slate Is Set Here

ANN ARBOR—District elimination debate tournaments of the Michigan High School Forensic Association began Feb. 8 and continue two weeks for more than 150 Michigan high schools. Now in their 43rd year, the tournaments will be climaxed by the state championship debates at the U-M, April 23.

The winning Class A (over 500 enrollment) and Class B schools will be eligible to send a representative from its debate team to Ann Arbor to participate in the \$2,800 College Scholarship contest on that date.

Last year nearly 7,000 students participated in more than 2,000 individual spring forensic contests

which were conducted before 1,000 judges. Local contests will be run at Seabrook, Feb. 18 between Royal Oak, Dundero and Kimball, Warren and Seabrook, and at Cranbrook, Feb. 19 between St. Cyril (Detroit), Detroit Country Day, and Cranbrook.

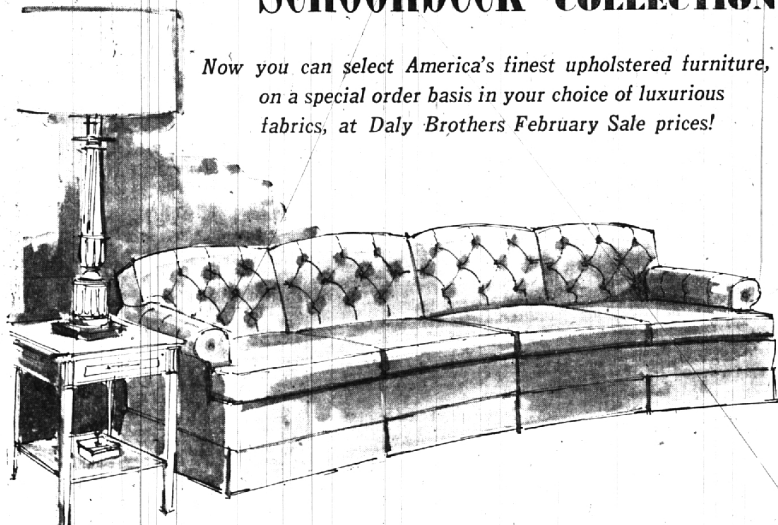

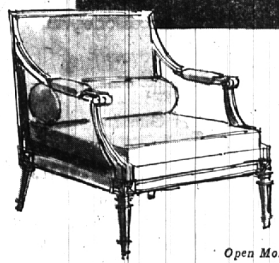
