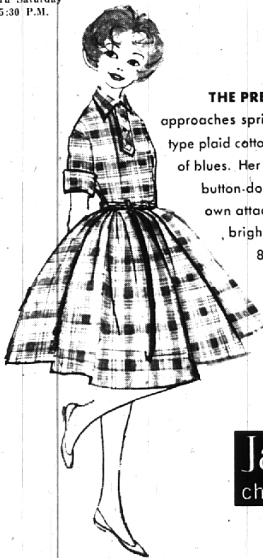




**A Junior Queen**

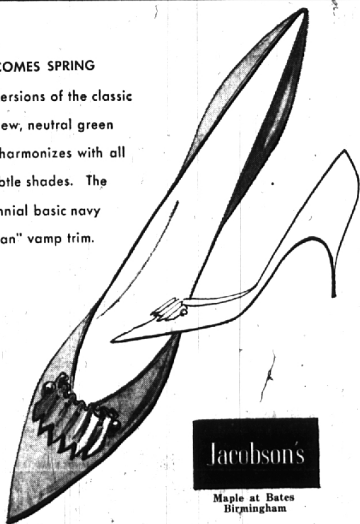

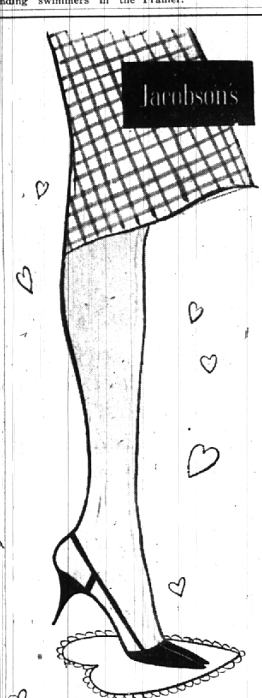

Frederick's sculptures may be seen in the Detroit area at the Northland Center, at the Veterans Memorial Building, and at the Detroit Civic Center.

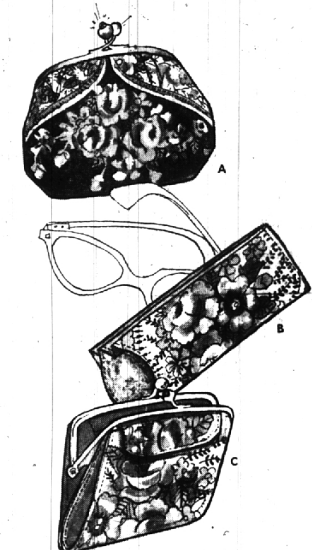
A Basketball Play day for several schools was held for the first time in the Cranbrook gymnasium, Feb. 6.
