Construction to Start On New Country Club

CRANBROOK—"Come join us for swimming and relaxation this summer," says a brochure recently sent out by the Cranbrook country club committee.

Sound good? According to the committee, response has been enthusiastic. Construction will start by the middle of March on a site near 13 Mile and Evergreen. Plans are for a large Olympic-size pool with two diving boards, underwater lights and heated water. There will be a canteen, bar, and umbrella tables available at the pool.

Children will have a private splasher pool and a playground. The committee plans convenient parking space, a bath-house, showers and dressing-room areas.

THE CLUB WILL be set up as a not-profit corporation with a \$200 membership fee. First year dues are set up at \$65 and it has been estimated dues will be reduced to \$55 thereafter.

One and a half acres of land was originally donated by developer Rodney M. Lockwood to get the club started. The balance of the club's three-acre plot was purchased from Lockwood at a reasonable price on favorable terms.

Meadowlake Road Protest Gets Action

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—It was cold outside, but inside Bloomfield township hall Monday night, the atmosphere was warm with emotion.

Some 70 residents of Meadowlake Farms crowded into the township hall to protest a recent condemnation of the Meadowlake township board, and ask the board to rescind its action.

The happy faces of Meadowlake residents demonstrated that when the people speak, township officials listen.

The aching feet of those who had standing room only testified to the township's need for the larger meeting hall now being planned.

THE LARGE turn-out resulted from a resolution by the board in January "to cooperate with Oakland county road commission to bring condemnation proceeding to acquire a road easement in Meadowlake Farms."

The easement would have connected with a road easement in Franklin Woods Manor and provided a continuous circuit between the two subdivisions.

Homer Case, township treasurer, explained to the township owners the board's position that a road connection between the subdivisions was advisable for better police and fire protection.

SPOKESMAN For Meadowlake Farms association, attorney Clyde Fulton, argued that heavy traffic would result, endangering the lives of children in the subdivision. He also voiced resident opinion that police and fire protection was adequate enough without connecting the subdivisions.

A resolution from Franklin Woods Manor association, addressed to the board, was read. The resolution stated that Franklin Woods residents were agreeable to the connection provided the road would be open only to police and fire trucks.

As a resident after resident of Meadowlake rose to attest that they wanted the subdivision to remain as secluded from traffic as possible, for the safety of their children, Homer Case rose from his chair.

"I propose that we yield to the wishes of the people," he said, "and I offer a resolution that we rescind our previous action." The motion was seconded by board member Sam Reeve, and unanimously adopted.
