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go light; cutting back the high bank on the east side of Franklin road south of Romney Way to provide space for sidewalks or a path protected by a guard rail and painted cross walks at Carol road and Franklin. D. Carleton Bell To Fill Vacancy On Review Board

SOUTHFIELD TOWNSHIP—D. Carleton Bell, Franklin architect, was named to fill the vacant board of review post Tuesday by Southfield township officials.

Bell will replace John Roberts, who by moving from the township to Birmingham, no longer qualifies as a board of review member. Roberts was elected in 1955 for a four-year term of office. Bell was a member of the board of review several years ago. Bell lives at 31800 Bradingham, Franklin.

Orrin Gully and Township Supervisor Hugh G. Allerton are the other two members. The board of review meets every March to set tax assessments.

IN OTHER ACTION, the township decided not to appeal the recent trail-and-sewer decision with the split with Southfield city of finances assessed in 1955 for the uncompleted sewer project. The matter will be referred to Beverly Hills, Franklin and Bingham Farms villages for their consideration.

to have withheld, she said, were paying the costs.

THERE ARE 24 signers of the letter. Mrs. Campbell said, adding that "There are probably 100 people who know of the sympathy with our point of view. There is need for additional flood control, and we need to take up the whole community to get it."

The letter states, "You can vote AGAINST the elaborate \$700,000 storm water sewer and ditch-digging program Tuesday without stopping the sanitary sewer program. The circuit court will soon issue \$25,000 in bonds to pay for construction of the necessary sewer to collect and deliver all of Lathrup's sanitary sewage to the Evergreen interceptor. This will solve our pollution problem regardless of the outcome of the vote on the \$700,000."

"THE 1,031 residences and 21 commercial buildings in Lathrup village as of November 25, 1959 would be irrevocably mortgaged for nearly all of this \$700,000 plus interest. This means that each Lathrup home, with an average assessment of \$7,650.80, would have to pay 6 1/2 mills, or \$47.84 per year ADDED city tax, for 30 years."

"WE ALREADY are committed to an annual tax of four mills for the court-issued bonds to construct the sewer to the Evergreen interceptor, for an average of \$30.62 per home, per year, for 30 years, in addition to our present 7.5 mills city tax."

"Our total city tax would THEN be \$127.75 per assessed thousand, for the next 30 years. This means that each year the average Lathrup home would pay \$135.85 city tax."
