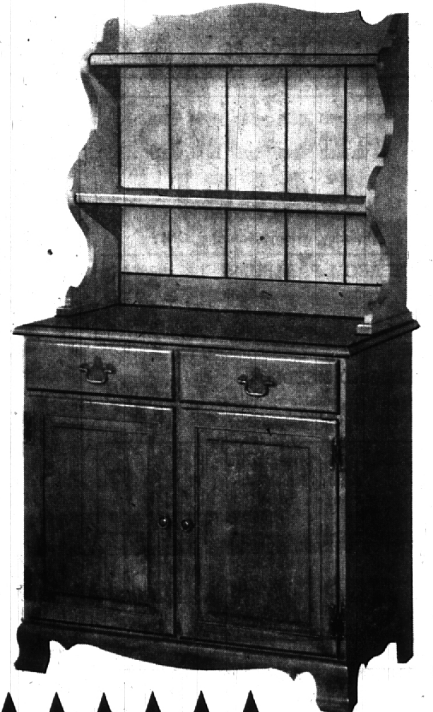

Troy News Briefs

Have 30 Days To Decide

TROY—Apparently in no mood to play, the city has given Fine Hill subdivision residents 30 days to persuade each other to grant rear-lot easements for the construction of sewers in the 112-home area.

Sewers will be installed under the streets if the easements are not granted. Although all residents of the subdivision cannot agree on the need of and demand for the sewers, they can agree that rear-lot easements would be cheaper (an average per-lot cost of \$600 for the rear installation, as opposed to \$700 for the front).

City Commissioners at the same time approved the installation of sanitary sewers in the 85-home Leonard Lane subdivision. They will be paid for by a \$79,000 special assessment, City Assessor Robert D. Romer said. Lots will be assessed on a footage basis, and the average assessment per lot will be \$600, Romer said.

City Puts Out Gas Flare-up

TROY — The City Commission recently put the cap on a flare-up of gas station owners when it reduced the gas-pump fee.

The city commissioners brought Troy fees into line with those neighboring municipalities abandoning its \$10-per-pump flat rate. The new rate of \$10 each for the first three pumps and \$5 for each additional pump was made retroactive to Jan. 1 since several station operators had paid the old fee under protest.

Reduction of the fees caused dismissal of a hearing in Troy justice court Wednesday against 14 operators who had refused to pay. Lack of inspection of the pumps was a chief complaint of the operators. They will be inspected once a year by a fire marshal, City Manager David W. Hasee children; his parents; the A. B. promised.
