Parenteen Group Progresses With Questionnaire, Meetings

Two questionnaires, prepared by students under the guidance of the Parenteen steering committee, have gone to press.

This means that Birmingham area parents and students will have a chance to sound their views on the scope of social activities for teenagers. The questionnaires will be in the mail soon.

Tallying of results and the compiling of a code remain to be completed. The study will be only for information and will not be an attempt to formulate any sort of a legal code.

THE PARENTEEN committee has developed an educational program available for presentation to PTAs, churches, civic groups and service organizations. A tape recording has been made to give reasons for and the details of the development of the committee.

Along with the tape is a series of colored slides which point out the important information on the recording. A representative of the Parenteen committee will attend any meetings to answer questions.

Elementary schools are urged by the committee to hold special meetings of fifth and sixth grade parents to discuss ways to cut down social pressures students face when they start junior high school.

A number of Pembrace school sixth grade parents have held one meeting at which they discussed ways and means of reducing forthcoming seventh grade social pressures and their resultant problems.

MRS. ELEANOR PALUBIN, chairman of the Parenteen steering committee, stressed that the study program including the questionnaire and meetings is merely an attempt to find out what parents and teens think of the increasing clip of social activities for young people.

ORDINANCE NO. 557

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 527

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.3 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 527 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, AND THE ZONING MAP, BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 3.3-13.

THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Section 3.3 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527, be amended by addition of a section to be known as Section 3.3-13, said Section to read as follows:

Section 3.3-13. Property located on the southeast corner of Ann and Frank Street, described as Lots 31 and 32, Blockley's Addition shall be changed from its present classification of R-6 Multiple-Family Residential Zone District to B-1 Non-Retail Business Zone District.

Section 2. The Zoning Map attached to Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.

Ordained by the Commission of the City of Birmingham this 8th day of February, 1960, to be effective upon publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 556

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 527

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.3 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 527 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, AND THE ZONING MAP, BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 3.3-12.

THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Section 3.3 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527, be amended by addition of a section to be known as Section 3.3-12, said Section to read as follows:

Section 3.3-12. Property located at 240 Daines Street described as West 42 ft. of Lot #20, Brown's Addition No. 1 shall be changed from its present classification of B-2 Neighborhood Business Zone District to B-1, Non-Retail Business Zone District.

Section 2. The Zoning Map attached to Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.
