Torry PTA Meeting

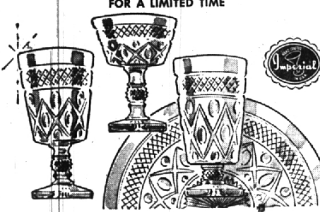
