Then with only several minutes left, John Fraser scored in unassisted fashion, the Eldorados goal and putting the score at 3-2.

In another outstanding play, Terry McGovern took a screen shot that slipped past the goalie and put the score at 4-4.

**MUNICIPAL SKATING RINK:** The Municipal Skating Rink is open for skating through the month of February. The annual ice show, "Skater's Holiday," will be held Sunday, Feb. 21 at 7:30 p. m. Admission fee is 25¢ for children and 75¢ for adults.
