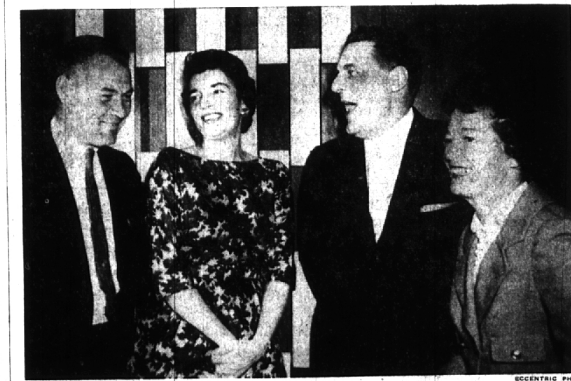
International Folk Ball Coming!
