PTO Award 3 Persons Talk At Southfield Citizen Meeting Is Named

At a recent meeting of the Bloomfield Hills P.T.O. grant committee, these officers were elected: president, Dr. Mark Dale; treasurer, Dr. Harry Lichtwardt; secretary, Dr. Jack Hertzler.

Representing the various schools of the Bloomfield Hills district at the meeting were Dr. and Mrs. Paul Trimmer from Eastover, Eugene Johnson of Hickory Grove, the Harry Lichtwardts of Valley Woods, the Mark Dales from West Lake, Dr. and Mrs. Ralph Fox representing the junior high, and Mrs. Max Miller from the senior high school.

Before the next meeting it is hoped that permanent representatives will have been appointed from all schools.

A SELECTIONS committee was created to choose the recipients of grants. The plan is to have a three-member panel with its connection with the Bloomfield Hills school system. Two members will be educators and the third from industry. Applications for these grants are to be in the hands of the committee by April 1. Awards will be made April 15.

THE PTO COUNCIL invited Dr. Mark Dale to attend its March 3 meeting and present the purpose and mechanics of this Bloomfield Hills teachers' grant fund. It is hoped that closer cooperation may be established between the PTO and the teachers' grant committee.

asking him why he had sent out all that misinformation without ever attending an information meeting." Hanson continued, "He said he couldn't attend the meetings because that was his bowling night."

HANSON was obviously referring to John R. Kohl. A letter written by John G. Campbell was read during the meeting by Mrs. Campbell. The letter stated that present plans for sewage disposal are now inoperable. The letter urged the use of weirs in type of dam in the Evans drain. According to Campbell, properly installed weirs will reduce the stream to alluvial.

When Hanson said, "Well, that letter proves that the dam will not work," Mrs. Kelley assured council members that she has no complaint on the proposed sanitary system.

A FORMER city councilwoman, Kathryn Feyereisen, 2644 Meadowwood, said the dam project proved that residents do not want a separate system. Miss Feyereisen favored a dam of Milwaukee type and a chemical treatment plant. She urged the council to open their minds to all opinions.

Mayor Cogger explained that a treatment plant would require three chambers, acreage and about \$200,000. The dam would cost \$10 thousand.

"Why not consider special assessment districts?" Miss Feyereisen asked. SPECIAL assessment districts constitute problems, too, the mayor told her. They must be paid off in ten years or less. You must have the approval of 70 per cent of property owners, the mayor explained. He added that you cannot special assess more than 25 per cent of the city's land.
