Couple Sails Away On Yankee Clipper

FRANKLIN—The sound of the trade winds in great 100-foot sails still lingers for Mr. and Mrs. Regal Meier of S. Greenbrier. Home after 10 glorious days aboard the fabulous yacht, the Yankee Clipper—a majestic brigantine that has sailed around the world seven times—the Meiers are still recuperating from their adventure.

Guests of the ship's owner, H. Savage, they traveled at the team work of the 18-man crew, all students or young men who abandon commercial pursuits for the privilege of serving, without pay, on this sailing quest.

Group Kicks Off Drive For Community Center

FRANKLIN—A smorgasbord dinner — with a thinking man's flavor—was the official kickoff for a campaign to raise \$85,000 for a new Franklin Community Center.

Over 120 men, representing a cross-section of Franklin and its neighboring communities, assembled at Franklin Community center church last Thursday night to hear Franklin Community association plans for the proposed project.

"The Franklin Community association is embarking on an aggressive fund raising drive to replace a building lost in the fire over two years ago," Gordon McAlpine, association president said.

"WE ARE going to provide a social and cultural center to serve the area. One that can be used for a recreation center for youth activities, social dances, club meetings of large and small groups, Franklin Village Play ers and Junior Players activities—as well as all association activities."

Provisions can be made for village officers. We are looking forward to active support of the entire community in this endeavor," McAlpine stated.

Members and their guests were shown projected charts on slides, including proposed financing by Archie McCarrel, James P. O'Neill, and other committee chairman, gave supplemental information as questions rose from the audience.

AT THE present time, the association owns a six-acre site adjacent to the village green. The land valued at \$35,000 was acquired following the 1958 fire at the old community hall. Plans include a \$35,000 mortgage for the new construction, with approximately \$50,000 to be raised by private subscription.

Strong emphasis was placed on the fact that neighboring areas, Bingham Farms, Wood Creek Farms, Meadowlake, Wing Lake

and parts of Bloomfield township acknowledge Franklin as their recreation center. Their support would be expected.

Despite the absence of a home, program plans announced by Jack Steels include a spring dance in May, a square dance in April and a theatre party with 60 seats for the April 1 performance of "Music Man." These will be reserved for couples on a first-come, first-served basis, with bus transportation included.

Youth Chairman Len Madge announced there would be a bowling clinic for youngsters March 5 at Star Lane. A senior-junior youth dance is planned for May.

Although the Franklin Community association is a quasi-public organization, members voted Thursday to make provisions for the village to acquire all its property, at no charge, should the association ever disband.
