'What Do You Know? Mendel Was Right'

EDITOR'S NOTE: Science is very much alive among Americans among Birmingham youth. Here a Seabolt high school student tells of his modern variations on the experiments of the Augustinian abbot Gregor J. Mendel, conducted 100 years ago.

The fruit fly, familiar to everyone for its association with rotting fruit, has recently become one of the primary contributors to our knowledge of heredity.

At the suggestion of my biology teacher, Miss Paslay, I began a series of experiments with fruit flies in order to study the laws of inheritance that Mendel determined experimentally just one hundred years ago.

THE FASTER breeding fruit fly has now replaced Mendel's peas in genetic experimentation. I housed the flies in half-pint bottles which had to be sterilized to prevent the growth of mold. When it was necessary to examine the flies closely, I used ether or chloroform to knock them out so that I could observe them under the microscope or count them. A mixture of cornmeal, rolled oats, and molasses provided food for the flies, establishing pure stocks of sufficient quantity. I started a monohybrid cross involving the transmission of the characteristic of wing length through two generations.

I CROSSED normal flies with those of a mutant variety having short wings called "dumpy." In about fourteen days the new generation appeared.

Each of the offspring was half long-winged and half short-winged in its genetic makeup, but they looked exactly like their long-winged father.

This is because the characteristic of long-wingedness is dominant over short-wingedness, when both are present in the genetic makeup of an individual fly. The "half-breed" flies are called hybrids.

IN THE NEXT part of the cross I crossed two hybrids with each other. In the second generation, however, the offspring were not all

Hearing Set Jan. 11 In-DJ Fatality

TROY—A hearing in the New Year eve trial of the death of a disc jockey and newsreader is slated Monday for a 28-year-old Troy man charged with negligent homicide. Junior J. Kadrovach stood mute Saturday before Justice of the Peace Charles E. Losey of Troy. Carl F. "Cully" Stenzhorn, 26, 292 South Maple, Royal Oak, died instantly of injuries in the head-on crash on Rochester road near 15 Mile.

Troy Man to Head Citizens Committee

TROY—R. L. Stephens, Jr., president of Jentzen-Miller, Troy, has been named to head one of the key state-wide study committees for the Citizens for Michigan.
