Welfare Director At Meeting "Is Michigan a Welfare State?" will be the title of a talk by W. J. Maxey, director of the Michigan department of social welfare, when he appears before the American association of university women at their monthly luncheon in the Birmingham community house Wednesday. MAXEY has made a career in the field of public welfare, coming to Lansing as state supervisor of the Federal surplus commodities distribution program in 1935. He was appointed deputy director of state department of social service in 1943 and has been director since 1947. Among his major accomplishments in the legislative field was his sponsoring of a group of bills that have come to be known as the "Foster Care Bills," which have done much to stimulate improved service for children in the counties. FOR HIS many accomplishments in developing an adequate welfare program throughout the state of Michigan, Maxey was honored by Michigan State university with a degree of L.D. in 1957.
