Too Much Record To Look At? Ask Commissioners

IT HAS BEEN predicted by Charles Perkins, president of the record-keeping industry, that the introduction of a new, slightly more detailed state accident information form touched off a discussion of the relative merits of the amount of record keeping necessary in the police department at a recent city commission meeting.

"I wonder if the safety council plaque we get occasionally is worth all the record keeping and static compiling and clerical help," asked commissioner Carl Ingraham.

"IT SEEMS to be only getting statistics for the safety council and insurance companies. It must involve lots of time," Ingraham went on.

"But the national safety council says we're not spending enough time on it," Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley countered. Basically, the record-keeping is worth while, Moxley went on, "though there's much we can't use."

City Manager L. R. Gare said, "I think it's pretty much a waste of time."

Lawyer Ingraham said, "this (state) form is neither brief nor concise."

Commissioner Lance Minor agreed. "You'd think some lawyer fixed it up," he said.
