The leading factor in safe skiing, however, is the skier himself, say the experts. The wise skier observes safety rules and stays within the limits of his skills and strength.

Records show most accidents occur late in the afternoon; mainly because skiers are tired, slopes become faster, and growing shadows tend to conceal treacherous spots on the hill.

For this reason the Michigan tourist council and the national ski patrol advise: never take "just one more run."

Skiers Get the Breaks
—Fewer than You Think

LANSING—There's more fun than danger in skiing, according to national authorities on this rapidly-growing sport.

About four million American skiers of all ages will take to the slopes this winter and, as in any vigorous sport, some will pick up bumps and bruises.

However, the danger of fractures and other serious injuries is vastly overstated, says the National Ski Patrol, the patrol, an organization that promotes safe skiing, reports an average of only five injuries per 1,000 full days of skiing.

Aid skiers can reduce this rate by observing some simple rules of safety. The Michigan Tourist Council offers a number of safe-skiing tips for persons visiting the state's winter sports centers.

- THESE SUGGESTIONS** are advocated by ski authorities for both beginners and experts:
- 1) Get in shape for skiing by exercising regularly to tone up muscles before spending a day on the slopes;
 - 2) Seek professional instruction; don't take advice from a fellow beginner—most injuries are caused by poor technique;
 - 3) LEARN THE correct and proper fit of your ski equipment; use safety straps on your bindings to prevent runaway skis;
 - 4) Dress warmly to keep leg muscles warm;
 - 5) Wear ski goggles to prevent snow blindness;
 - 6) ALWAYS FILL in any holes

East Line of Lake Park to Chesterfield The City Commission of the City of Birmingham will meet Monday, January 18, 1960, at 2:00 p.m. in the Commission Room of the Municipal Building to consider any objections to the construction of certain improvements described herein and to the creation of a special assessment district to defray the cost of construction of an improvement to be hereinafter known as:

RESIDING ROAD PAVEMENT—East Line of Lake Park to Chesterfield consisting of construction of 28 foot concrete pavement along Residing Road from the east line of Lake Park to Chesterfield, together with necessary drainage structures and other work incidental to the project on Residing Road from the east line of Lake Park to Chesterfield.

The Commission proposes to create a special assessment district to defray the cost of this construction and said special assessment district shall consist of the following described property:

There is no detailed plan or estimates of cost on this project available, since individual assessments will not be computed until after such estimates have been prepared. They will be computed by the Assessor after January 18, 1960, and subject to this improvement is established by the Commission, and there shall be another public hearing scheduled for the purpose of reviewing the assessment.
