Southfield Buys Second Tractor

SOUTHFIELD—A second tractor-loader was purchased recently by the Southfield city council. City Administrator Robert J. McNutt was under council fire during the last three months because he failed to get road equipment without specific authorization. The machine was purchased after an expensive ordeal with another tractor-loader bought in 1953. The Hough tractor, rented to replace the broken one, cost \$4,600. Southfield spent \$3,910 as of Dec. 31 to rent it. Earle Equipment offered to sell for an additional \$800. Southfield accepted. S'field news briefs.
