**Recreation Round-Up**

**SKATING RINK:** The weekly schedule at the municipal ice rink includes 10 sessions of open skating, three hours of children's classes, two hours for men and women, one session of figure skating, six hours for hockey league play, one session for mothers and pre-schoolers and one hour of girls' broom hockey. For available rental periods call the ice rink office between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. or the Recreation office between 8 a.m. and 9 p.m. on weekdays.

**NATURAL ICE RINKS:** The natural rinks located at Pentbrooke, Popponist and St. James parks are open for skating when the weather permits.

**SLEI & SKI SLOPE:** The outdoor recreation area at Lincoln and Cranbrook is available for sledding, skiing and tobogganing when weather permits.

**ADULT RECREATION:** Adult Recreation is held at the Seaholm gym on Monday evenings from 7-10 p.m. for men and women, 15 years of age and older. Activities include basketball, volleyball, badminton, ping-pong and trampolines.

**FAMILY SWIMMING:** Family swimming is held at the Seaholm pool on Mondays, 7:30-10 p.m. and at Derby pool on Thursdays, 7-10 p.m. Children must be accompanied by their parents.

**WOMEN'S SWIMMING:** Women's swimming instructions are given at the Seaholm pool on Mondays from 7:30 p.m. for a fee of \$1 which includes admission to family swim sessions from 7:30-10 p.m.

**THERAPEUTIC SWIMMING:** Therapeutic swimming is featured at Barnum pool on Wednesdays from 7-8 p.m. for the physically handicapped. Fee is \$5 for 10 sessions. Register at the Recreation office.

**BOYS' BASKETBALL:** A basketball league for high school boys began at Derby gym on Wednesday, Jan. 13. Any adults interested in coaching a team should call the Recreation office.

Basketball for boys in the fourth, fifth and sixth grade is being conducted at the following elementary schools on Saturdays mornings from 9:30 to 11:30. Adams, Baldwin, Midvale, Pierce, Quanton and Torry.

Boys in the seventh and eighth grades may play at Barnum junior high on Saturdays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

**LADIES SLIM TRIM:** The second series of ladies' slim trim classes will begin Wednesday, Jan. 27 at Torry school from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. Registration fee of \$5 for 10 sessions is now being taken at the Recreation office.

**TEEN CENTER:** The Teen Center will again be open from 8:30-10:30 p.m. this Friday for recreation and dancing. Membership cards may be purchased at the Recreation office. The cards are good through next summer. On Jan. 22 the Center will feature a new dance combo from the area called the Epilons. Advance reports on the group are spectacular.
