'Newcomers To Assist Lions Comeback Role'

Although the playing end of the pro football season is now over, the rebuilding and planning for the next season goes right on.

At the weekly Birmingham Rotary luncheon held every Monday, the members were pleased to have as guests John Stevenson, 841 N. Gleggary Road, Bloomfield Township, a Lions board of director, Bud Erickson, Lions assistant general manager and public relations director and Ray (Scooter) McLean, assistant to head coach George Wilson for the past nine years. McLean was head coach of the Green Bay Packers for one season.

ERICKSON, after introductions, from Stevenson, gave the Rotary members a brief outline of Lion plans for the coming season, informing the members that newcomers will play an important role in the Lions team next season.

"We'll have a real outstanding group, with such talents as Johnny Robinson, LSU's great running back, Warren Rabb, star LSU quarterback, who was such a great leader in LSU's steamroller tactics on the gridiron," said Erickson.

"Other players that we have great expectations in will be Notre Dame's All American Inesman Bob Schultz, whom we hope to convert into an offensive center, which would then enable us to shift Charlie Ane to tackle."

"ROGER LEE BROWN, a 297-lb. tackle from Maryland State is another big reason why the Lions hope to have a good year in 1960," said Scooter, "with such emphasis on defense we have to constantly review our plays, seeing which are effective and which fail."

Asked about some of the present players, McLean said, "I think that Nick Pietrosante will be one of the game's greatest players, he's got the zest and a pride in his job. Fellow like Terry Barr should develop into one of the great receivers, although being on defense so much he hasn't had a chance to develop on offense."

When the word quarterback entered the talk, of late a rather delicate subject in the Lion's organization, McLean said this, "Earl Morrill will come to the fore by the end of next season. He's been studying hard behind the scenes and should be ready for greater things."

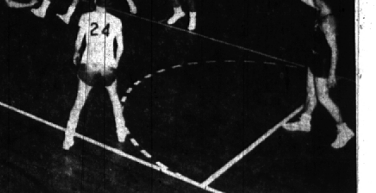
THE NEXT GAME will be with Mt. Clemens, who now shares first place with Seaholm, and East Detroit, each having a 3-1 record thus far.
