Return Must be Filed For Household Worker

Housewives who hire household help by the day or by the week have until Feb. 1 to file the quarterly social security tax returns on wages paid to their employees during the last three months of 1959, announced William E. LaRock, district manager of the Pontiac social security office today. Ordinarily, these quarterly returns would be due on Jan. 31, but that date falls on a Sunday this year.

A return must be filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue for any household worker to whom an employer has paid cash wages of \$50 or more during the three months of October, November, and December. Wages of as little as \$4 a week paid to a worker each week during this 3-month period will have amounted to more than \$90, LaRock pointed out.

HE INDICATED that many household employees are still not being reported for social security by their employers, although their cash wages from each employer may amount to well over \$50 in a three-month period.

This is especially true of "day workers," he said, who work for several employers during the course of a week. Each employer who pays such a worker a total of \$50 cash wages during the calendar quarter is required by law to file a return showing the name and social security account number of the worker, the amount of her wages, and the social security taxes due.

SOME EMPLOYERS, LaRock said, may not understand their responsibilities under the law. Also, some household employees may have asked their employers not to file the returns because they do not want to have their share of the social security tax taken out of their pay. The law, however, holds the employer responsible for making the returns and paying the taxes, he said.

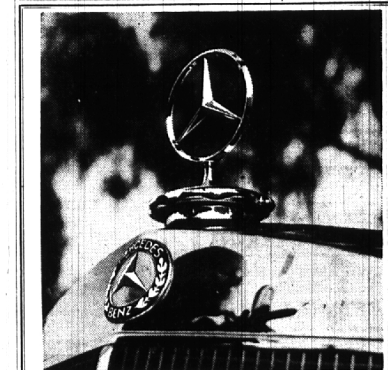
If not detected first by the Internal Revenue Service through routine enforcement procedures, employers who are not filing reports may be called for a reckoning in a number of different ways.

OR, LAROCK SAID, she may ask the nearest social security office for a copy of the booklet, "Do You Have A Maid." This little booklet of social security information for household employees contains a post card she can send to the District Director of Internal Revenue, asking that she be put on the mailing list.

Household workers who would like to know more about their rights and obligations under social security, or who need to get a social security card, should get in touch with the nearest social security office.

Camp Arbutus Reunion

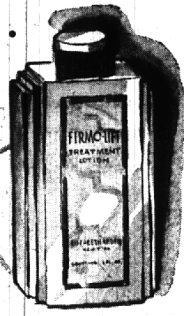
