Plenty Sugar for Two State Students

Two outstanding students will enter Michigan State university next fall, thanks to the beet sugar industry of Michigan.

For the fifth consecutive year the beet sugar industry is offering two \$1000 scholarships, one for young men in the field of agriculture and the other for young women in home economics.

Those considered for the scholarships must be eligible for admission to MSU as freshmen and residents of the Lower Peninsula.

Application deadline for consideration has been set at April 15, 1960 and the announcement of the winners will be made May 15.

Young men interested in the agricultural scholarship should make application to the Dean of the College of Agriculture at MSU, East Lansing, and young women should apply to the Dean of the College of Home Economics.

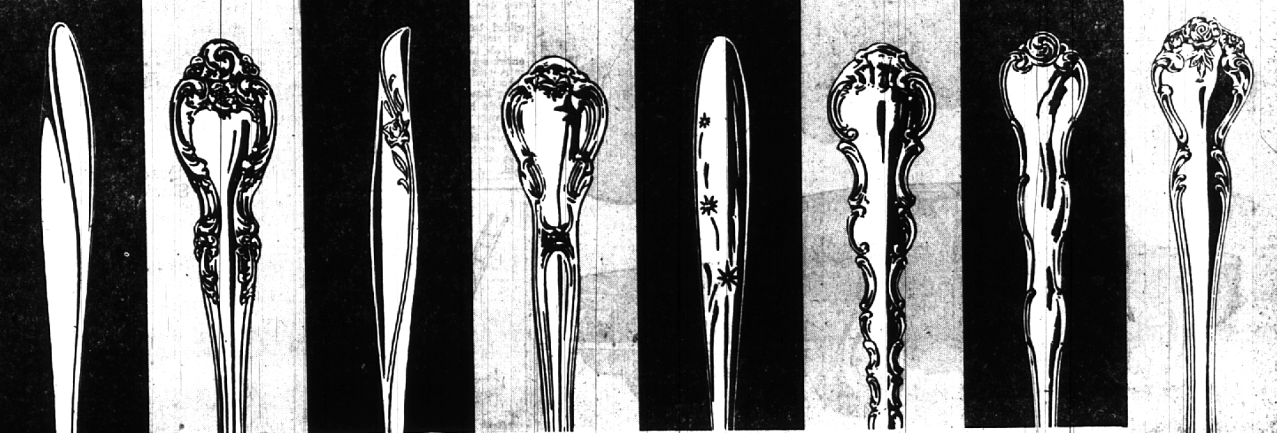
