Then There'll Be No Worries Till Next June

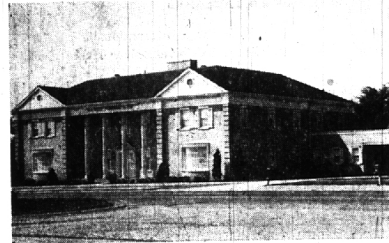
