**Local Pro Leads Golf Tournament**

Al Watrous, golf pro at Oakland Hills Country Club, Bloomfield Township, made a bid for his fourth title when he shot a one-under-par 71 for his first round in the \$15,000 PGA seniors golf tournament Tuesday.

Watrous won the PGA seniors title in 1950, 1951 and 1957. He was one-under par to lead the players five years of age and older.
