

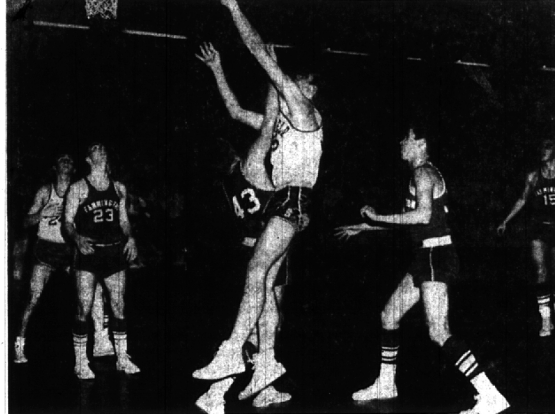
Seaholm Loses—Southfield Wins

Excellent Skiing For This Weekend

Ski clubs and resorts report excellent conditions after a week-long snowfall throughout most of Northern Michigan.

The Detroit area clubs—Dryden, Granpian, Mt. Christie, Mt. Holly and Summit—report good to excellent conditions, with night skiing available at each location.

- All areas report a good base, with new snow falling every day, promising the best skiing yet for this season.
- LOCATIONS of Detroit-area clubs are:
- Dryden—18 miles north of Rochester, 1 1/2 miles east of Rochester road.
 - Granpian Mt.—Two miles east of Oxford on Lakeview road.
 - Mt. Christie—Five miles north of Oxford on Davidson Lake road.
 - Mt. Holly—15 miles north of Pontiac on US-10.
 - Summit—Three and a half miles south of Fenton.

Southfield Plays Well In Victory

"We had the opportunities and we took them. My boys hit for 58 per cent against Farmington Friday night."

Southfield coach Will Steink's explanation seems to sum up the resounding 80-64 victory that the Bluejays had over Farmington. The first quarter was fairly tight, with neither team pulling more than several points ahead, but as the second quarter ended, the Jays enjoyed a 16 point lead.

IN THE FIRST two periods, the Bluejays collected 45 points, led by the sharp-shooting of center Ed Schaff, who led the scoring for the night with 12 points and six goals. The third quarter saw Farmington bounce back to within six points, but the hectic quarter proved too hard and the pressure eased on the Jays.

Southfield once again took up the attack, pressing Farmington into several costly errors and as the final buzzer sounded, the Bluejays were on top with another 16 point lead.

HIGH SCORER for the losers was Harvey Chapman with 23. Jim McGiffin and John VanBrunst pumped in 21 and 18 respectively for the Jays.

The big center from Southfield, Ed Schaff, has been averaging about 20 points for the five league games, one of the top scorers in the Inter-Lakes League this year.

Mt. Clemens Sunk Maple Tankers Win

The Seaholm tank team, under the expert guidance of coach Jay Myers, won their straight meet from Mt. Clemens, 75-21 last Friday night.

In winning, the Maples captured first place in all of the ten events, setting a new pool record and tying a school record in the process. Bill Driver set a swimming pool record-time of 1:06.8 in the 100 yard breast stroke, a time that is only six-hundredths of a second off the national record.

In the past three weeks the Maples have defeated the 50-yard State champions from Ann Arbor, Ferndale and now Mt. Clemens. In every contest, the Seaholm tankers have either set new pool records and/or broken old school records. The only blemish on their otherwise spotless schedule is a six-point loss to 51-45, to their arch-rivals, Royal Oak Kimball.

Seaholm will have the opportunity to even the series when they meet with Royal Oak Kimball Friday night at home.

In other events, Denny Collins captured two firsts in the 50-yard free-style and the two-hundred-yard individual medley races.
