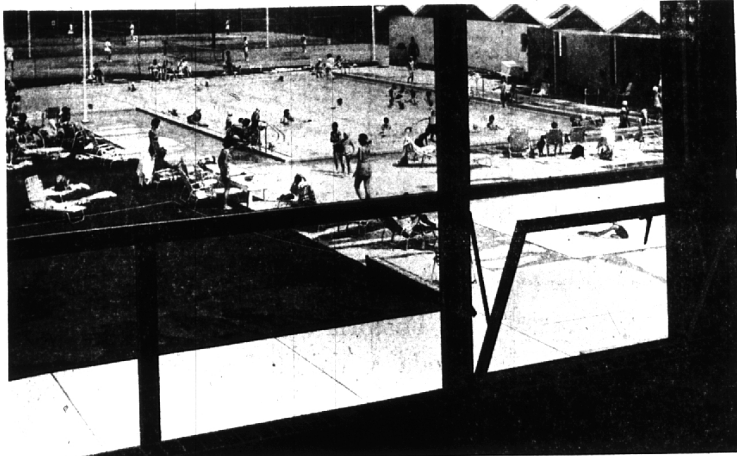

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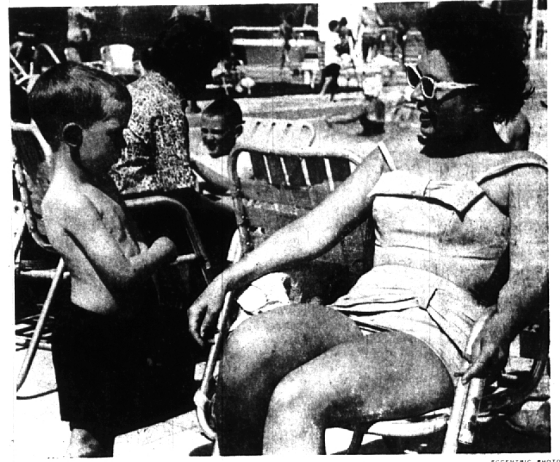
## A Typical Summer Afternoon at Birmingham Athletic Club

The 53rd annual convention of the American association of law librarians came to a close June 30 with a luncheon in the Hotel Leanington, Minneapolis, Minn., when A. Snook of Aspen road, Birmingham, picked up the gavel and assumed her official duties as president of the association.

One of the outstanding events of the meeting came in the closing minutes of the 53rd annual session with the adoption of a resolution creating a committee on accreditation.

THIS COMMITTEE will proceed to draw up and put into action a standard of qualifications for future AALL members who will be thereafter certified as qualified law librarians falling into classes of certification to be established.

Miss Snook has been active in the association since 1929 and has served on numerous committees, including the committee on index to legal periodicals.

IN 1964 she became a member of the executive board of AALL, which prefaced her election to her present position at president of AALL.

Miss Snook graduated from the University of Michigan in 1926, came to the Detroit Bar association library as assistant law librarian, serving under Olive C. Lathrup, from 1926 to 1947, at which time she was appointed to her present position.
