Ford Motor Promotes B'ham Men

Announcement of a revision in the product planning and marketing research activities of Tractor and Implement Division, Ford Motor company, to keep abreast of the fast-moving technological changes in agricultural industry has been made by Merritt D. Hill, vice president and general manager.

E. Scott Rumely, 207 Abbey, Birmingham, has been named to the newly created position of operations planning manager. In this capacity he will conduct special long-range studies for the division's general manager.

In announcing Rumely's appointment, Hill said that changes in agricultural technology and growth in industrial applications for the division's products have created the need for planning over a longer range than previously was necessary. "A broad variety of research and management experience uniquely qualifies Mr. Rumely to head this new type of planning office," he said.

Rumely joined Ford Motor company in 1938. Within the company he has served in a wide variety of management positions. These included shift superintendent for aircraft engine assembly and testing; industrial engineering and work standards department of the Manufacturing Staff; and transportation department assistant superintendent. Moving into product and program planning activities in 1949, he served at Ford division until 1952 when he became manager of program planning for Tractor and Implement Division.

In 1953 he was named manager of the product planning and programming office of Tractor and Implement Division. In his former position, he served as a member of the division's operating committee.

To succeed Rumely as manager of the product planning and programming office, Hill named Robert E. Owen, 554 1/2 Fairview, Birmingham, who has been manager of independent Product Planning department since 1949. He joins the division's operating committee.

Owen joined Ford's Tractor and Implement division in 1956. For six years previous he had been head of the agricultural engineering department of the Pineapple Research Institute at Honolulu, Hawaii, and earlier as a technical service representative of E. I. DuPont de Nemours and company, Wilmington, Del.

The division's marketing research department, managed by J. P. Fitzsimmons, 1853 Fairview, Birmingham, which has been a part of the product planning and programming office, has been given independent status, reporting directly to the general manager. Hill announced.

Fitzsimmons became a member of the division's operating committee. "This change will keep top level management informed at all times of the consumers' views and attitudes toward our product," he said.

Fitzsimmons became manager of Tractor and Implement Division's consumer research department in 1955, after 12 years' affiliation with Allis-Chalmers manufacturing company, Milwaukee. He was manager of commercial research for the general machinery division of that organization.

advancing over the clay. Each retreat would leave behind more sand and boulders. Despite its glamorous antiquity, the excavation is no source for fossils, unless an occasional unembedded in some of the more ancient rock to the North (around Alpena and Rogers City) was slucked out by the moving ice and capriciously deposited here by the fickle drifts.

Fossilization here is not likely because the time has been too short for the relatively slow process that alters organic matter into rock. ACTUALLY THE Ice Age had a geographical heyday in this area. When the ice melted out of the Great Lakes, other vast lakes formed. And this area, which is part of the Outer Belt of the Laurentian, was once the site of arctic Lake Whittlesey, with vast beaches covering the landscape.

If anyone should flip "Here's mud in your eye" be sure to check where the mud came from. It's worth a college education to track down the history that is occupied up in the excavator's shovel.

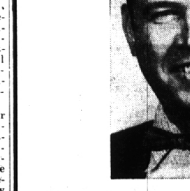

Gary Neil Harlan, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Harlan, 1278 Humphrey, was taken to William Beaumont hospital with lacerations of the forehead and two puncture wounds of the lower left leg. At last report, a hospital spokesman described his condition as "improving" but that no date had been set for his release.

Gary's father is a Birmingham fireman assigned to the Adams station.

THE BOY was riding his bicycle when he collided at the intersection of Woodward and Adams with a car driven by Harold V. Rohm, 35, 90 Maplewood, Pleasant Ridge, about 8 p. m. last Thursday.

Ronald Penz, 5, of 1271 Emmons, was riding his bike on Emmons street near his home about 10:30 a. m. Thursday when he collided with a car driven by William W. Ward, 73, of 998 Emmons.

Richard escaped with minor cuts and bruises despite being dragged 34 feet by Ward's car.

POLICE SAID Richard rode out from behind a parked car. The two collisions prompted police to issue a reminder to motorists that summer months bring increased numbers of youngsters onto the streets on bicycles and greater caution is required to avoid accidents.

Parents also are urged to emphasize safety rules for bike riding to their youngsters and to warn them away from main thoroughfares and busy intersections.
