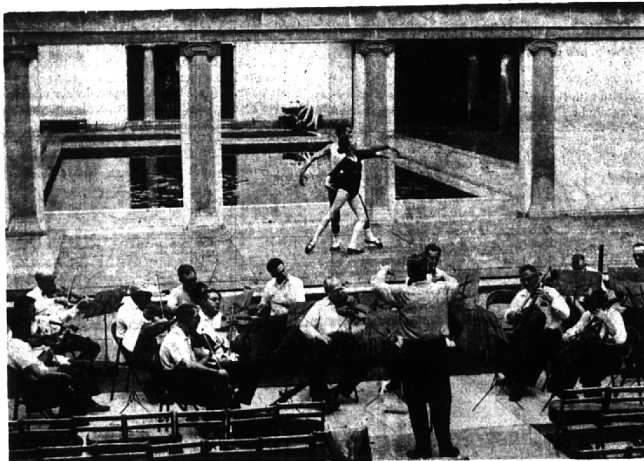
Centerpiece for the patio tables were arrangements of pink geraniums on an Italian outwork table cloth.
