

### Dutch Elm Control Needs State Assist In B'field Twp.

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP — A plea to Bloomfield township's board to create a campaign against Dutch elm disease in the township was made Monday night by Dr. H. L. Riggs, 3419 Franklin road, Bloomfield Hills.

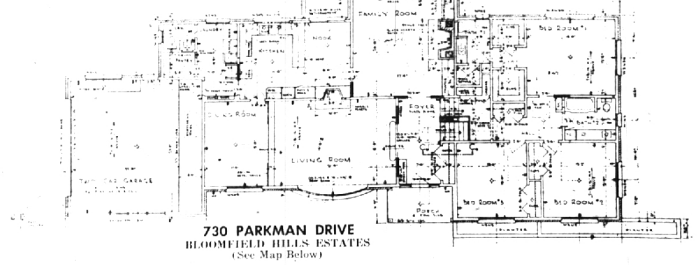
Dr. Riggs cited his own loss of more than 100 elm trees, and expressed anxiety over the survival of elm trees in the township, unless the township waged a campaign for residents' compliance with the state law designed to fight the disease.

Dr. Riggs was asked by the board to continue with his efforts to obtain the state's interest in assisting the township in the future. THE BOARD expressed agree-

ment with Dr. Riggs, but cited its legal inability to enforce the state law, under a township form of government.

Homer Case, speaking for the board, said that for two years the township had attempted to get state cooperation when the township tried to wage a voluntary campaign against the disease.

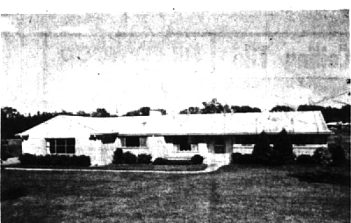

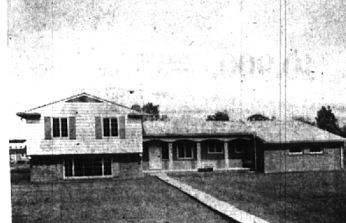

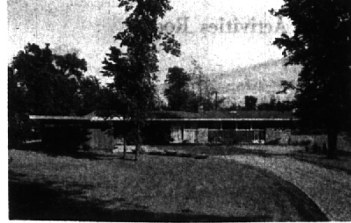

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### Discuss Road Repairs During Council Meeting

FRANKLIN—A weed ordinance, a peddler's permit ordinance, dog control and roads were considered Monday at the Franklin village council meeting.

Following a public hearing June 29, the council created a special assessment district on a benefit basis for the blacktopping of four roads in Dorchester Hills subdivision. The residents of the roads appeared in favor of the paving and the council directed the board of assessors to make up the assessment roll. Costs will be shared equally by about 40 lot owners and shall not exceed \$50. On July 27, at 8 p.m. there will be a second public hearing to review the assessment roll.

**STATE TO START PROJECT TO BETTER ROAD INTERSECTION**

LANSING—Bids will be taken here Sept 7 for a traffic betterment project at one of the most hazardous intersections in the Oakland-Macomb county area. Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said today.

It is the intersection of US-24 (Telegraph rd.), M-24 and M-58 just south of Pontiac.

IN 1959, there were 22 accidents at this intersection and seven people injured. More than half of the accidents were caused by left turning traffic from southbound M-58 to eastbound M-58 and M-24.

The intersection ranked tenth in the highway department's annual compilation of the Pontiac district's (Oakland and Macomb counties) most hazardous intersections.

MACKIE POINTED out the accident rate here has been going up in the past three years. In 1957, there were 15 accidents and seven injuries; 18 accidents, one fatality and ten injuries in 1958; and 22 accidents and seven injuries in 1959, he said.

The betterment project, which will cost an estimated \$80,000, will provide a ramp from M-58 to eastbound M-58 and M-24.

The ramp will make left turns safer. The ramp will be built just north of the three-way intersection.

**STREET ADMINISTRATOR** Norman Naimark reported that a great deal of work and permanent improvement on the roads had been accomplished in the months of June and July. A letter will be sent to the residents to explain in detail the work scheduled for the second year of the 8 mill program.

C. W. Cousineau Excavating company of Trenton was awarded the contract Monday night as lowest bidder of six companies to bid. Sterling Garrett company of Northwestern highway, who have been working on Franklin's roads for several years was \$57 over the Cousineau bid. The council accepted the engineers recommendation to accept the lowest bid.

**VILLAGE PRESIDENT** Calvert Thomas suggested study be given to means of controlling or prohibiting salespeople in the area. Mitchell recommended a poll be made to determine public sentiment on the matter. Also, ordinances of other municipalities will be studied for methods of restricting such activity.

Study will also be made of weed control on vacant property. Giting several neighboring communities who insist that unimproved lots be kept cut, the council agreed similar measures would be desirable in Franklin.

The council took no action Monday night on a possible dog ordinance. Residents bothered by dogs were advised that complaints may be brought to the local Justice of the Peace under the Michigan Dog Law.

The council adjourned until July 27 at which time there will be a special meeting to award contracts for the Dorchester Hills special assessment district.

Blakeslee quoted from a Michigan supreme court decision in the case of Guat vs. Canton which held that since the state of Michigan recognizes trailer camps as legal residences, they cannot be legally prohibited by a township.

Blakeslee also opined that if no restrictions were made on trailer camps in the zoning ordinance, they could be built in the township without any restrictions on them at all.

**IN OTHER AREAS**, the new zoning ordinance makes few changes from the present ordinance. According to chairman Whitmer, "it is an attempt to clarify a number of questions that have come up in the past few years of interpretation of the present zoning ordinance. In addition, the new ordinance incorporates all zoning changes which have been made within the township in the past several years," he said.

Other members of the zoning board include Leo DeConick, Mrs. Don Connor, Vernon Barker, John Haps and Frank Bowles.

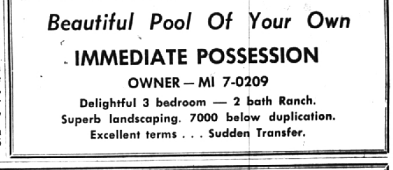

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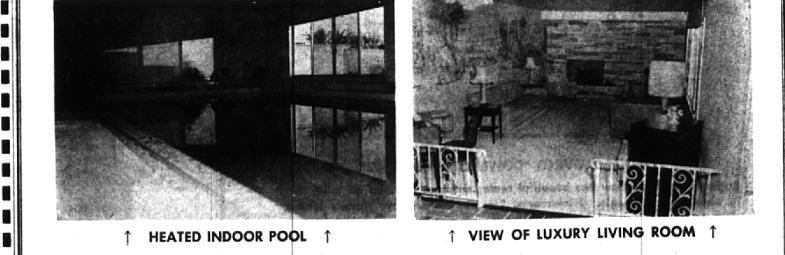


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↑ VIEW FROM FAMILY ROOM WINDOW ↑
