

Franklin Names Four Planners

FRANKLIN—Four new members were named to the planning commission Monday night. Three will replace members whose term have expired and one, George Wellington Smith, will be asked to serve as an ex-officio non-voting member.

Carl Rasmussen, Orland Ellis and Richard Kern will succeed Robert Hampton, Arthur Woods and Smith for three year terms. President Calvert Thomas suggested the new status for Smith as an honorary post warranted by his constant interest in the community development over many years.

THOMAS STATED, however, that men having business interests in Franklin should not be asked to serve on the planning board and hoped the rule would continue in future administrations.

Remaining on the board are Frederick Gehb, Harold Roseberry, J. Carlton Bell, Dr. Dwight Engen, Fred Worden and Walter Dreyer.

New officers of the group will be elected at the July 25 meeting to be held in the village offices at 8 p.m.

Acting Postmaster Waits for Approval

LATHRUP—Approval of Robert C. Stegar as permanent postmaster of Lathrup will not be acted upon until after the Senate reconvenes Aug. 8. The appointment went to the senate in late June.

Stegar has acted as replacement for retired David Redwood since last September. He lives at 18530 San Diego and was in the engineering business prior to taking over his postmaster's duties. The city's post office is located in the city hall and employs two carriers and two clerks.

LATHRUP—William Andrew Carnegie, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carnegie of Glenwood, Lathrup, was honored at graduation ceremonies of the United States Air force academy recently.

The second youngest graduate in the 1950 class, Carnegie was one of seven graduates to receive a bachelor of science degree. With a double major, they are the first of any service academy graduates to receive such a degree, including academics elsewhere in the country.

Carnegie, finishing with a total of 220 credit hours as opposed to the 185 ordinarily required for a BS degree, took his degree under the Curriculum enrichment program for gifted students.

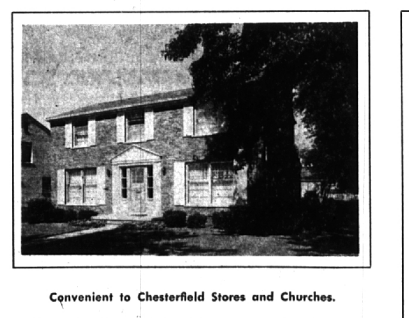

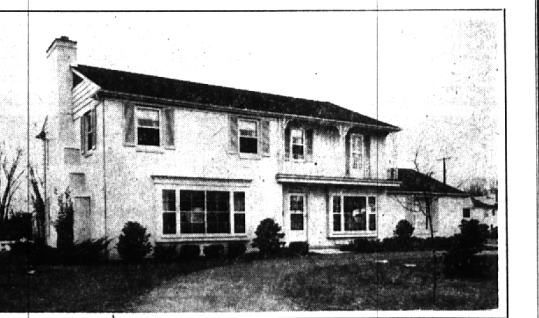
