



## Our Lady of Orchard Lake Shrine

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A year of colorful activities will come to an end July 19 for SS. Cyril and Methodius seminary, St. Mary's college and St. Mary's high school, Orchard Lake, when they celebrate the climax of the Diamond jubilee year founding in 1885 by Father Joseph Dabrowski. His Excellency John Dearden, archbishop of Detroit, will preach the sermon at the pontifical mass of Thanksgiving. One major project to be realized at the XVII National Orchard Lake alumni association convention will be more concrete plans for the construction of the Our Lady of Orchard Lake shrine on the campus of the Orchard Lake schools. The shrine will cost an estimated \$600,000.

## Noted Protestant Ministers to Speak At Kirk in the Hills During Summer

Six of the most celebrated Protestant ministers in America, including President Eisenhower's pastor, will deliver guest sermons this summer at the Kirk in the Hills, according to the Rev. Dr. Harold C. DeWindt, minister of the Bloomfield Hills church.

Starting on July 24, and continuing for seven Sundays through Sept. 4, the Kirk's pulpit will be occupied by one of the most distinguished groups of guest preachers invited to speak in the Detroit area.

The Rev. Dr. George Arthur Buttrick, famous lecturer, author and recently preacher to the University at Harvard, will again launch the summer schedule with guest sermons on two Sundays, July 24 and 31.

"Last year Dr. Buttrick inaugurated the Kirk's program of outstanding guest preachers," Dr. DeWindt said, "and we are happy to have him return. He and the other great clergymen who will visit us during the coming weeks furnish ample evidence that the Kirk does not believe in diminishing its ministry during the summer months."

"Throughout the summer months, we will continue with our two regular services each Sunday

at 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. The full chancel choir will also sing at both services.

Now visiting professor at Union Theological seminary in New York, Dr. Buttrick is in great demand as a guest preacher and lecturer at colleges across the country. He has written several books on prayer and preaching and is general editor of the "Interpreter's Bible," a 12-volume commentary on the Holy Scriptures. Before going to Harvard in 1955, where he was Plummer professor of Christian Moral, Dr. Buttrick served at the Madison Avenue Presbyterian church in New York City.

THE REV. DR. EDWARD L. R. ELSON, Minister of the National Presbyterian Church of the Washington, D. C., will be the Kirk's guest preacher on Aug. 7. Pastor to the President and Mrs. Eisenhower, members of the cabinet and other notable in government, Dr. Elson is the author of numerous religious articles and books. His latest work, "Am I His Spouse?" was published earlier this year.

Dr. Elson was a chaplain in the European Theatre and two years as president of the Military Chaplains association. He was named National Chaplain for the year of the Disabled American Veterans. Since the war, he has made several visits to the United States and has served in an official capacity on many national religious and cultural committees. In 1954, he was honored as "Clergy Churchman of the Year."

THE KIRK'S third guest preacher will be the Rev. Dr. Frederick B. Speakman, who will visit the Kirk on Aug. 14. Pastor of the Third Presbyterian church in Pittsboro, N.C., Speakman is the author of "The Salty Tang" and "Love is Something You Do," both of which enjoyed wide circulation. A dynamic clergyman-author, whose latest book "The Storm and the Rainbow" was best-seller, he will visit the Kirk on Aug. 21. The Rev. Dr. Lowell Russell Ditzgen is pastor of the Reform church in Brookville, New York, and nationally known for his writings and radio-TV appearances.

Dr. Ditzgen has spoken at numerous colleges and has preached abroad in several countries. He has participated in ecumenical work here and abroad and was granted awards for his sermons seven years in a row from the Freedoms Foundation.

ON AUGUST 28, the guest preacher will be the Rev. Dr. Elmer C. Homighausen, Dean of the Princeton Theological Seminary. One of the nation's recognized theologians, Dr. Homighausen spoke at the Kirk last summer. He has preached in many American churches in foreign countries and has made several ecumenical missions to Asia and South Africa.

Dr. Homighausen, who has traveled extensively abroad, is chairman of the joint department of evangelism of the National Council of Churches. He has held the Charles R. Erdman chair of pastoral theology at Princeton since 1954.

COMPLETING the summer schedule of guest preachers, the Kirk in the Hills will welcome to its pulpit the Rev. Dr. James I. McCord on Sept. 4. Dr. McCord was recently inaugurated as the fourth president of one of America's most respected ministerial schools, Princeton Theological seminary. A native Texan, he was formerly pastor of the University Presbyterian church in Austin and professor of Bible at the University of Texas.

Dr. McCord has held responsible positions in connection with the World Alliance of Reformed Churches and has traveled and lectured abroad in the interests of the church. He is currently chairman of the new advisory committee on faith and order of the National Council of Churches.

DR. DEWINDT will return to the Kirk pulpit on Sept. 11, after a vacation trip to Europe and Russia aboard the Moore-McCormick cruise ship, the S.S. Argentina.
