These workers have a right to be retrained for new employment when their jobs are lost to machines, and the right to support their families while training for new jobs, with the help of unemployment

"A climate for people also includes men, women and children who are deprived of first-class citizenship by group prejudices and discrimination. These barriers must and discrimination. These barries had in-come down throughout our public and in-stitutional life if we are to be true to our democratic claims, and if this nation is to command respect and exert leadership in
