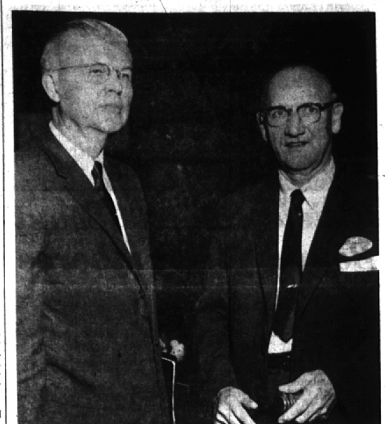

APHIDS reach their peak this month and their leader is A. PHID CASTRO. They can do immense harm. Sock them once a week with MC-B SPRAY, ISOTOX or MALATHION.

TOMATO production can be lengthened by rooting suckers now. Use ROOTONE if you try this technique.

CRABGRASS can be eliminated by a spray or two with SUPER ARTOX or ORTHO CRABGRASS KILLER. We believe a better date is August 1st to August 7th. By then most of the seeds will have germinated.

TRANSPLANTING of iris, oriental poppies, and day-lilies (hemerocallis) are made with success at this time.

PICNIC TABLES of cedar can not only be seen in our shops at this time—they can be PURCHASED. BUILT, CHAINED, OR PAID FOR and can be taken away by you if you are lucky. At this moment (Sunday eve.) there are 2.

RED SPIDER MITES show up in droves in dry hot weather. Watch out for yellowing or fading of the green color. Shake the branches on a CLEAR white paper. If tiny moving specks appear spray immediately (the evergreens, not the paper) with Mc-BALL INSECT SPRAY or ISOTOX.

A NEW SHIPMENT of bird baths, sundials, etc. has arrived. Now is the time to set up a real FOCAL POINT in your yard.

ASPARAGUS should not be cut anymore. They need feeding of AGRICO 5-10-5 or GARD-N-GRO 4-12-4.

ROSES should continue to receive XXX ROSE FOOD for growth and PHALANT spray for blackspot control.

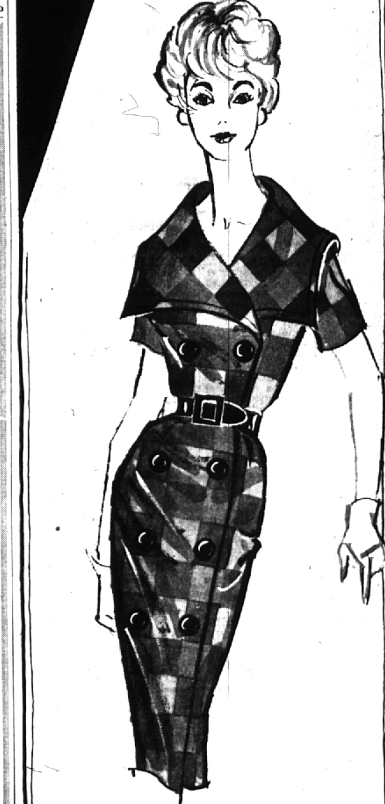
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
