In Oakland County . . . Remember There's Two-Moore-Row

The game of the "Name's the Same" which has been going on during the past weeks between two candidates for Oakland county bench seats took on a new twist last week.

It was disclosed by County Clerk-Register Daniel T. Murphy Jr. that Moore, as in Probate Judge Arthur E., started the whole fracas over his name being left off the ballot. The confused citizen of Oakland county were led to believe earlier that Moore, as in Ralph S. Jr., was the precipitant of the dispute.

MOORE, THE former, is running unopposed for re-election for the four-year judgeship. Moore, the latter, is running as one of eight candidates for a new two-year job on the probate bench. Murphy, the only said he did not include Judge Moore's name on the sample ballot he originally sent to Lansing for state review. The clerk said he acted under a 1955 law that allows direct certification of unopposed candidates. The sample was approved by the state.

At this point the Judge exhibited "the lawyer in him" and objected. The fog began to roll in.

HE CITED A 1947 supreme court case and a constitutional clause which requires judicial nomination at primaries, unopposed or not, and declared his name should be on the ballot.

The matter was taken to the county election commission, where it encountered Moore, the former, and the chairman of the commission. The name was put on the ballot, over the objection of Moore, the former, who brought suit against the judge.

IT IS REPORTED that the judge spoke only of Ralph Moore's complaint, not his own, when he detailed the election commission decision. It is, possibly, could explain the earlier reports that the complaint emanated from the latter Moore.

Last Tuesday afternoon the case went to court before Circuit Judge William John Beer and the outcome resulted in "Moore" confusion. Judge Beer ruled that he could find no conflict between the constitutional clause cited by Moore, the former, and the existing law governing primary elections. The state supreme court is being flooded by a drainage problem over 75 miles away.

Local Group Hears Kellis Talk on CIA

Criticizing the efficiency and record of several federal agencies, especially the Central Intelligence Agency, James Kellis, of nearby Berkeley, will address a group of local Democrats tonight at the home of Mrs. Irene Murphy, 444 Bonnie Briar.

Kellis, married and the father of two sons and formerly a colonel in the U. S. Air Force, is waging a vigorous campaign to win his party's nomination for Congress.

If successful, he will compete in November with Republican William S. Broomfield to represent our 18th District in Washington.

HE ALSO WORKED with the Office of Strategic Services (OSS) during World War II, and with NATO intelligence. He is a staunch supporter of the FBI.

"Jim Kellis is that rare individual who is on fire with the determination to enlist his services to the Congress, to the end that he may contribute his experience and talents to the nation's defenses," stated Mrs. William Oates, Jr., 627 Waddington, one of Kellis' strong supporters. "He also pledges himself to a program of opposition to all unnecessary expenditures of the taxpayers' money."

Kellis favors a great centralization of the various federal intelligence agencies, so that not only the executive branch of the federal government may better be kept informed, but Congress, too, may obtain more vital information on such subjects.

Committee Studies Schools in County

The Oakland county school system will come under scrutiny soon by a 12-member legislative committee studying elementary and high school problems.

Sen. Arthur Delmet (R-Unionville), chairman of the interim committee said the committee is accepting an invitation to come down and look over what he called Oakland county's "real big operation."

The Oakland invitation was sent to Delmet by William J. Emerson, county superintendent of schools.
