

Community Tennis Entry Form

The Birmingham Community tennis tournament, co-sponsored by The Birmingham Eccentric and the Birmingham recreation department, will be held August 1-10, at Etow Park.

The tournament is for players in the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills school districts and Lathrup. It will be played in eight divisions. Junior boys and girls singles divisions are for youngsters 8-12 while boys' and girls' divisions will be held for players 12-17. Men's and women's divisions are for persons 18 years and over and all ages must be as of Jan. 1, 1950.

An entry fee of 25 cents for the men's and women's division and 10 cents for the boys' and girls' division will be charged. Fees must be paid at the courts the first day of play.

Trophies and medals will be awarded winners and runners-up.

This form should be filled out and mailed to Community Tennis, Recreation Department, Birmingham Municipal Building. Entries must be in the hands of the tournament officials by 5:00 p.m., July 28.

Players can compete in both singles and doubles. Players from this area may play on a doubles team with a person out from the area.

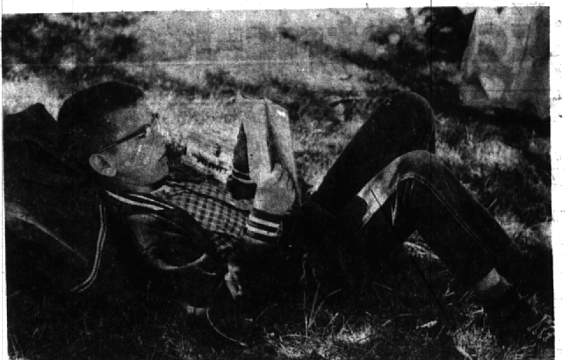
